
Humanities Enrichment

Humanities refers to the subjects of History and Geography. Each class studies three History and three Geography topics over the course of the year, spending a half term on each. This ensures they get the coverage of skills and knowledge required by the end of their time with us.



Trips and activities:

Each class is encouraged to go on trips or partake in activities to enrich their Humanities learning:

Year 1: Making maps of school and local area for Geography

Year 2: St Paul's Cathedral for Great Fire of London topic in History.

Year 3: Local area walk for Geography local area topic.

Year 3/4 and 4: British Museum for Ancient Egypt, planned Natural History Museum for Volcanoes and Earthquakes.

Year 5: Trinity House for Lines of Significance Geography topic.

Year 6: Horniman Museum for Ancient Benin, V&A for Early Islamic Civilisation.






Art:

When we did Clay as a whole school Art project, several year groups used their Humanities topic as their theme. Year 3 created Roman aqueducts and Year 6 created Ancient Islamic candle holders.

Home projects

Fieldwork:

At Kings Avenue, we value fieldwork as an important geography skill and useful tool to discover more about the world. Children in every year group create maps, explore the local area, compare features with those from other parts of the world, and use compass direction and grid references when describing location.
